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

1. [DORN] BOYDELL, Christine. The Architect of Floors: modernism, art and Marian Dorn designs



Cover design is Claridge's Hotel, London with rugs by Dorn 1932. Loosely inserted 12pp supplementary catalogue. Although relatively recent, this is the only monograph on the Modernist rug designer, Marion Dorn, born in Menlo Park, California on December 25, 1896 & died in Tangier, Morocco on January 28, 1964. Her first major commission was for the Savoy Hotel Group in London, her last in 1960 for the White House, Washington DC. [Ref: 20713] \$110

2. DREW, Jane and FRY, Maxwell in collaboration with FORD, Harry L. Village Housing in the Tropics with special reference to West Africa Intended as 'a guide for those responsible for locating and designing villages...'

London, Lund Humphries 1947 134pp illustrated with b/w plates and line ills. Long 8vo. Decorated wrappers. Defines the issues surrounding new build houses for tropical areas covering house design, layout of village services, landscape conservation and tree planting. Hard to find. Written with colonial overtones and with the end papers showing the Colonies as they then were.



The book itself, written whilst Fry & Drew had postings in West Africa, was a key publication in considering the role of architects and planners in Africa. It adopts a blanket approach to housing in tropical environments but was the start of the duos interest in the subject and by 1956 they had revised their view to be more locally relevant across the tropical world and they promoted distinctiveness by culture and country. The publication of books by women designers reflects the increasing the visibility of Women Artists at the time. Active from 1874. She trained at Lambeth School of Art. John Sparkes introduced her to Henry Doulton c1874 and she worked full time at Doulton's in Lambeth until 1897. She inherited a legacy in 1897 and thereafter gave more time to oil painting and regularly exhibited at the Royal Academy. A dessert and tea service was painted by her for Queen Elizabeth in 1887. Head and base of spine and corners sl. bumped and cloth slightly worn. Decorated end papers with floral motif. Inner front hinge shaky. In 1885 May Morris became director of Morris & Co.'s embroidery department. This book is the only published text illustrating her approach to needlework. It provides an introductory guide to embroidery for beginners. The book contains sections on the history of the craft, stitches and techniques, design and colour. At the turn of the century she taught embroidery at the Central School of Arts & Crafts in London and at Birmingham's Municipal School of Art. 7. [SCOTT, Elisabeth] CHESTERTON, A. K. Brave Enterprise A History of the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre Stratford upon Avon

London, J. Miles & Co Limited 1934 60pp illustrated with b/w plates. Open weave cloth. With photograph of the architect taken in 1928 outside a front door and amended for publication in a newspaper. The original theatre, burnt down and which led to the construction of this one. The architect was Elisabeth Scott. In 1928 Elisabeth Scott won the international competition for the new Shakespeare Memorial Theatre at Stratford-upon-Avon. The only woman in a field of more than 70, she was still too young to vote. Yet three eminent architects, two English, one American, had picked

her to design one of England's most prestigious interwar theatres. The appointment led to considerable press furore which is the origin of the photograph for sale here. Whilst now acknowledged as a key architect, in her lifetime, Scott was largely forgotten when she joined Bournemouth Town Council architects' department in the late 50s. Verso of the photograph is stamped from Word Wide Photographs and reads "London, Eng. Miss Elisabeth Scott, daughter of a Bournemouth doctor, whose design for the building to replace the old theatre at Stratford-on-Avon was unanimously chosen by the Anglo-American Committee as the best submitted to them 1/11/28" [Ref: 20690] \$220

8. HOWARD STREET CLUB SHEFFIELD [Dinner Club for Women Workers] Arts and Crafts Exhibition Sheffield: Three items

Sheffield Printed by W J Northend 1915 The Dinner Club for Women Workers was opened by the Lord Mayor Col. Branson in September 1914; At the time about 400 dinners were served every day at mid day for the provision of a proper mid-day meal for working women and girls. By 1915 it had a deficit of £550 between income and spending on meals and the Arts and Crafts Exhibition was proposed to raise funds for the scheme. Women, especially in the silver and cutlery trades, could have dinner and tea. In its time it had links with the suffragist's movement in Sheffield and over the years more than 50,000 women ate there. The club ran until 1956. In 1875, Ruskin chose Walkley as the location for St George's Museum to house a remarkable collection of paintings, drawings, architectural casts, books and minerals. Its purpose was to educate and inspire the metal-workers of Sheffield, whose skill he declared the best in the world. One can speculate about links between his enterprise; The Guild of St George and this exhibition.

1} 8pp proposals document for an exhibition to be held June 29th, 30th and July 1st 1915

2} Arts and Crafts Exhibition Catalogue 56pp listing the exhibits and their prices. Sections in the exhibition were for Art, Needlework and Embroidery, Printing, Bookbinding etc., Jewellery, Pottery, and Glass, Woodcarving, Silver work, Lace, Children's work and an Eastern Section. Makers include a series of well-known names including Alfred Parson, Lady Scott and many other women makers.

3} Single page list of pledges and donations with their givers to "The Dinner Hour Club for Working Women and Girls" under chairmanship of J Rossiter Hoyle Esq. [ex Master of the Cutlers]

Items 1 and 2 have decorated wrappers. Both are rather foxed on wrappers but internally good. The bottom of item 3 has been folded else good. [There are two other incomplete leaflets with this concerning the appeal and those who donated.]

No copies of these items located in Institutional Libraries.

Susan Taylor, a contemporary Sheffield Artist, who made a piece of work based on this Club, told me that the club operated on a tokens basis and no money was exchanged for the meals. The silver industry was largely one carried out in small workshops thus the need for a specific location where women could go and eat their meals. The women were generally known as "buffers." Her work, which was is an installation, is held at Sheffield Museums and Art Gallery. [Ref: 20614] \$580



The first nineteen panels mainly illustrate nursery rhymes and were made for University College Hospital; the next six, for St Thomas' Hospital, show pairs of scenes from fairy tales; the next four show nursery rhymes; and the last two, made for the Children's Hospital at Paddington Green, illustrate the Nativity, and Christ as the Good Shepherd. Wildenhain studied at the Bauhaus under Max Krehan and became the first woman to receive the master potter certification in Germany. She emigrated first to the Netherlands enforced by the Nazi regime, then to the USA in 1940. Once in the USA, in 1942 she was one the first artists to move to the Pond Farm Artist's Colony (Pond Farm Workshops) founded by Gordon and Jane Herr. Uncommon. [Ref: 19397] **\$165**



This was presumably a display album illustrating the kinds of items which Bierberkraut could make. The images are approximately 120 x170 or less, for commercial, religious and domestic buildings, some images of housing schemes in Germany including the Habimah Theatre. James Bieberkraut [1879-1975] married art photographer Helena Joseph in 1928. Until 1934 James Bieberkraut was demonstrably based in Munich and worked as a painter and etcher. They lived at a number of residences in Munich; including Neureutherstrasse 18, and finally Linprunstraße then, probably because of the Nazi Regime, emigrated to Palestine in 1934. These images suggest they moved to Tel Aviv. Both extremely talented artists in their own right, Helene as an architectural photographer and James as an etcher, engraver and model maker as well as book restorer in this latter capacity assisted in unrolling the Dead Sea Scrolls for restoration. Helene's photographs here record the contemporary White City Style of the Bauhaus emigré architects who made their homes in Tel Aviv and the wider areas of Isreal after leaving Germany. Very good. Before World War II, in the Nazi period, he emigrated to London, where he lived at the Isokon Building during 1939 and in collaboration with Jack Pritchard, designed the Donkey, the Gull, the Bottleship and the Pocket Bottleship in plywood for Isokon. He moved to Scotland, and in the post war period worked for the Scottish Coal Board as an architect. This is his only book. The theme is the organic development of space based around the duplication of rooms as the base unit and which was a common theme in German town planning. 



No 5 includes contributions by Ian Colquhoun, James Dartford, Ronald H. Sims and Gordon Mitchell. Includes major article on the London bus types and developments, national planning and schools. Contributors included Jeffrey Jellicoe amongst others. No 6 was produced by a group of 13 students including Andrew Derbyshire, John Killick and Hugh Morris amongst others, and is themed around Architecture, Building an Education. No 7 is a study of the position of Architecture in our time "in the broadest possible terms." 14 students in the group producing this edition. No 8 includes a leading article by Bruce Martin on "How to Build" photographically illustrated, with additional articles on Stevenage and the history of flight. Two further issues were published as additions to this series in 1951, [not present here] from with a Birmingham Editorial group and which, according to Hugh Pagan "have a more radical edge." By using the device of the fictional county of Hamptonshire Ashbee divides his work into seven chapters on 'The Elementary School,' 'The Secondary School,' 'What is meant by Higher Education,' 'On Certain Aspect of Education in Agriculture,' 'On the Teaching of Art in the Countryside,' 'The Hamptonshire Experiment' and 'Difficulties of Administration and Finance.' It was published at the beginning of World War I, an untimely moment as the work overshadowed by events. It advocates processes to ensure that traditional crafts were kept alive. Individual photographs could be ordered from these catalogues, while for customers who needed illustrations of particular themes, separate lists were available of photographs selected from the existing stock to meet their needs. In 1881 these specialised lists included 'Old-Half timbered and Stone Mansions' and 'Old and modern Queen Anne Residences, Schools etc.', and over the next 20 years many more selections would be available including 'Town and Country Houses and Mercantile Buildings', 'England's Homes: Blenheim, Hatfield, Haddon, Hardwicke [sic] etc.' and several series of furniture and woodwork' (Nicholas Cooper, *The Photography of Bedford Lemere & Co* (Swindon, English Heritage, 2011), p. 15). This set was presumably made for the French speaking market. All the images in this set have been identified and a list is available with the collection. They are almost all country house interiors focusing on the main rooms of the house, staircases, panelling and so on. Preserved in a modern handmade box which also contains the original gilt lettered label loosely inserted.

Making cyanotype copy prints, from a series of reference or 'master' prints to compile a catalogue would have been an economic solution to providing images, however, the ease of production method



reduced the apparent intrinsic value as images as the blue colouring was considered to be inferior to the sharpness of the original albumen prints. However such trade publications rarely appear and this collection is a superb example of a photographic trade item from which the specialist purchaser or public could select images they required. The images would then have been printed up as architectural source material as albumen prints. According to Cooper, in 1881 standard albums of 50 or 60 images from the Royal Architectural Museum were available and another album of St Pancras containing 20 images could be purchased. This set of images is a rare survival of how commercial architectural photography was emerging in the late 19th century; one from which a client could pick and mix preferences. Architectural photography at this time was booming becoming the must have item for architectural practices. Where collections are known to have existed, they often contained a combination of images of this kind, alongside those collected on tours to Europe where a trade in photographs which showed architectural monuments, details and settings of buildings were produced for key centres such as Venice, Florence and Rome.

Manchester University Special Collections hold a set of these 50 images but they are rare. Another set of these images comprising 86 were also issued. Worldcat lists one other complete set of *Intérieurs Anglais*, at the Stiftung Bibliothek Werner Oechslin, Switzerland. The Getty Research Institute holds 82 of the set of 86 cyanotypes (lacking nos. 10, 65, 67 and 81). RIBA also hold part of this series. Historic England have the largest holding of Bedford Lemere & Co's surviving photographs: 21,800 large-format glass negatives and 3,000 unique prints, which comprises one quarter of the firm's estimated total output of 100,000 images. Hickleton Hall was designed by James Paine in the mid-18th century 1745–48 for Godfrey Wentworth replacing an earlier house designed in the 17th century for the then owner, Francis Rhodes. In 1828 it was sold to the Wood family. The son of the first owner, was Charles Wood, created Lord Halifax in 1866 on ending duties as Chancellor of the Exchequer. The Wood family retained the house until 1947. They owned another house outside York, Garrowby Hill, which they preferred and made that their major seat. The house became a Sue Ryder care home and remained thus till 2012 when it was sold and has been converted into luxury apartments. The garden shown in the images here was probably the work of Lord Halifax [d 1934] who acted as his own designer. There is at least one image indicates in the caption that a new garden building was under construction. A useful album, despite the small size of the images, giving insights into the inter-war design of the gardens and social history of this fascinating house. Reverend Wilson had allegedly threatened libel action against Charlotte Bronte at the time which apparently led her to tone down her descriptions of the school. When Elizabeth Gaskell wrote her biography of Charlotte Bronte she blamed the school's regime and inadequate food for the deaths of Maria and Elizabeth Bronte and for the poor state of Charlotte's own health. Letters by Edward Carus-Wilson (grandson of William Carus Wilson) which recount the tale of the intended libel action were sold in 2006 at a Shropshire Auction House. The book on offer here is a pattern book for the design of non-conformist chapels and parsonages and school rooms; it is a fascinating design book but unfortunately does not throw light on the Charlotte Bronte controversy. 

This essay was first printed at Mr. Walpole's private press at Strawberry Hill in 1771, when it appeared at the end of the fourth volume of 'Anecdotes of painting in England' under the title: 'The modern taste in gardening'.
